HIGHWAYS AND VERGES

Verges

Dunham Massey is home to a rich variety of roadside verges that have the potential to support an abundance of wildlife from wildflowers and insects (including vital pollinators) to small mammals and birds. As such, it's imperative that we try and find the right balance between maintaining neat, accessible verges and encouraging wildlife and biodiversity.

To help progress this, the Parish Council have been holding quarterly meetings with Trafford's Senior Environmental Contract Manager. Trafford Council recognise that Dunham Massey is quite a unique area compared to the vast majority of the borough of Trafford, so it's important to discuss how the maintenance of verges in Dunham and the surrounding area can be improved and a balance with nature achieved.

Since we commenced the discussions over a year ago, we have been aiming to establish a baseline maintenance routine in key areas of our parish, which includes regular mowing of selected verges, gulley clearing, targeted hard surface spraying to control weeds and regular leaf clearance. At the same time, we're identifying areas that require less intervention, allowing nature to thrive more freely throughout the year. Hedge maintenance also plays a role in this effort, though trimming is restricted to the September to February window to avoid disturbing nesting birds. Hedge maintenance remains primarily the responsibility of landowners.

Litter continues to be a concern, particularly during verge cutting times, which we have been highlighting on a regular basis, and a new procedure is due to be introduced that will increase the frequency of litter collection during these periods. Of course, maintaining verges is inherently seasonally driven so it will take some time to fully bed in, but hopefully you will have seen an improvement in the verges in our area and once we have mapped out our plans for the parish, we will share them on the Parish Council website.

Highways

Many of you will be aware of the government's commitment of an estimated £500 million additional funding specifically designated for filling potholes. Local Councils are required to publish annual reports detailing their spending on road maintenance, the number of potholes filled, and their long-term road maintenance plans. Councils that fail to meet the reporting requirements risk losing 25% of their funding. Trafford Council is reported to be investing £5.4 million in repairing potholes and pavements this year. As a result, we've seen a noticeable increase in maintenance of potholes within Dunham Massey including the resurfacing on Sinderland Lane, which was completed in June.

Despite this progress, we recognise that there are still some areas that need urgent attention, including Black Moss Road and School Lane running towards Big Tree. We have written to Trafford requesting plans for future resurfacing work but the response is that there is no further budget available this financial year. However, any actionable defects that appear, or are reported or observed during their inspections, will be repaired using reactive maintenance budgets. We therefore strongly encourage all residents to continue reporting potholes and other surface issues via the Trafford Council online portal: Roads, Pavements and Rights of Way Do it online - Trafford Council

We were also delighted with the interest shown for the Neighbourhood Plan with a number of you registering an interest to get more involved in the plan as we move forward. All involved had a great time and the money raised on the stand was donated to the May Day event.

NEIGHBOURHOOD PLAN

We are going ahead with development of a Neighbourhood Plan which, as we have reported before, will help to give us a greater say in local planning decisions. We had a good response from residents to our request for people interested in forming a consultation group. We are aiming to set up one or more such groups during September and if you are interested in being involved but have not yet told us, please let us know.

The one bit of disappointing news is that the government has announced that it will no longer provide grants to help fund the development of Neighbourhood Plans. The grant scheme has been going for a number of years and has been judged a success in enabling local communities to put together Neighbourhood Plans. It therefore came as a shock to everyone, including ourselves and our proposed planning consultants, when the government announced that there would be no further grants available.
